## 2 Dead, 2 Hurt in First Avenue Blaze

# Firemen From Seven Towns Help

ENTIAT, Chelan County, Aug. 26.—(A.P.)—Fire swept into the outskirts of Entiat today for the second time in 12 hours, but the town was saved from serious damage with aid of Fire Departments from seven communities.

Two separate fires, north and south of this Columbia River town of 286 persons, had spread to more than 9,000 acres of grass, brush and timberland by early afternoon.

### All-Night Fight Wins

Fire-fighters worked all night to keep the lightning-set blazes away from the town and first succeeded early this morning.

But near midday one fire jumped the Entiat River south of town. It burned a few out-buildings before it was controlled with aid of firemen from Leavenworth, Wenatchee, Cashmere, Sunnyslope, Monitor, Malaga and Chelan.

"We think we've saved the town again," Ken Wilson, communications officer of the Wenatchee National Forest, reported.

Two farm homes burned during the night. The families escaped unhurt.

One fire, in Sander Canyon, north of town, had covered 1,500 acres of grassland and brush and headed west toward timbered slopes early today.

On the south, across the Entiat River from the town, a fire on Spencer Ridge had covered 1,000 acres.

### Planes Spray Chemicals

Fire-retardent chemicals were sprayed on the flames from five planes and tractors were used to cut fire lines.

In answer to an emergency appeal, 200 soldiers were scheduled to leave Fort Lewis by truck this afternoon to aid in battling the fires.

The appeal was made by Forestry Service officials, who said all available manpower in the Entiat area had already been thrown into the fight.

The Sander Canyon blaze started late yesterday as lightning hit in a rangeland baked by weeks of hot, dry weather. Sheets of flame swirled 50 to 100 feet in the air as the fire raced toward the town.

### Orchards Help

While townspeople fought this blaze, the Spencer Ridge fire threatened from the south.

"Townspeople and orchards saved the town," said F. M. Morrison, assistant in charge of fire control for the Wenatchee National Forest.

The fires slowed as they reached irrigated apple orchards ringing the town. Morrison said damage to orchards was not severe.

# Norway's King Visits U. S. Nuclear 'Sub'

OSLO, Aug. 26.—(A.P.)—King Olav V. boarded the United States nuclear submarine Skate today and stayed longer than he had planned.

The King is the first Chief of State to visit the submarine. The Skate arrived in Norway last week after a trip under the ice of the North Pole.

"This is the greatest honor which ever has befallen the Skate," Comdr. James F. Calvert said after the royal visit.

"He became very interested, and the time just flew. He asked some very perceptive questions, too. He really knew what he was talking about."

The royal banner—a golden lion on a red field—was raised by Jerry Taylor, quartermaster, of Gary, Ind., when the King went aboard.

The Skate's cook, Raymond Aten of Dover, N. J., had baked a four-layer cake decorated with Norwegian and American flags.

"He liked the cake," the bearded cook said.

# Court Monitors Challenge Hoffa 'Cleanup'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(A.P.)—Court-appointed monitors, keeping watch over the scandal-stained Teamsters' Union, today demanded an explanation of what James R. Hoffa, union boss, is up to in creating his own commission to hunt down racketeers.

The board instructed Hoffa to furnish by August 28 a "detailed report concerning the reasons for the establishment of the commission, its powers and duties, its proposed procedures, and its proposed relationship to the board of monitors."

In a letter to Hoffa, Martin F. O'Donoghue, chairman, said the board had learned of Hoffa's "antiracketeering commission" only through the press.

"This commission is being created and appointments are being made without consultation with, or even notice to, the monitors," O'Donoghue wrote.

Hoffa, reached at Senate Rackets Investigating Committee hearings, said "it is correct I did not tell the monitors in advance" about creating the Teamsters' rackets squad.

"I've turned it (the letter) over to our lawyers; that's what we pay them for," Hoffa said. He added he assumed the union will reply to the monitor.

Judge Denies Encouragement

Publication of the letter coincided with a denial by United States District Court Judge F. Dickinson Letts, who created the monitor board, that he had encouraged former Senator George Bender, Ohio Republican, to take up the antiracketeering job as head of the Hoffa-appointed commission.

Bender had said he received such encouragement in consultation with the judge.

Bender also quoted Judge Letts as saying there is a need for a cleanup in the union.

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# Faubus Asks Legislature For O. K. To Shut Schools

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 26.—(A.P.)—Gov. Orval Faubus today asked the Arkansas Legislature to empower him to close the state's public schools—specifically Central High School—against forced integration.

The governor also told a special session of the Legislature that it must "defend our rights against those who would usurp them."

Faubus has said the school-closing measure is necessary to avoid a repetition of the rioting that occurred outside Central High School a year ago, when Negroes first were admitted to its classrooms.

Election Proposed

The proposed bill provides for a school-district election within 30 days of closing a school to decide whether to keep it closed or to integrate and reopen it.

The governor also offered a last-ditch measure to the lawmakers—a bill to set up segregated classrooms within an integrated school.

In his eight-page message Faubus declared:

"We, as public servants, elected by the vote of our people, would be unworthy of the confidence reposed in us, and of the honor bestowed upon us, should we be unwilling to face the issues as free men should, and do everything in our power that is possible to be done."

"I hope that no one of you will be influenced by the words of the weak and fearful, and that no one of you will be misled by the mistaken views of those who would surrender all the rights and privileges we have enjoyed to an all-powerful federal government in the unwise course of action which it pursues at the present moment."

"The issues which must be faced and decided by free men have never been easy, and the tasks which must be performed by a people who would remain free have always been difficult."

High Court to Rule

Faubus' address came 48 hours in advance of a special United States Supreme Court session. The high court is expected to decide whether to grant Central High a breathing spell in integration, or to direct immediate re-entry of Negro pupils to its classrooms.

The School Board last night postponed the reopening of Central to its 2,000 pupils from next Tuesday to the following Monday, to allow a little easing of the time pressure on both the State Legislature and the Supreme Court.

Faubus in his legislative message asked a further postponement to September 15.

# Killings Precede Hammariskjold Visit in Beirut

BEIRUT, Aug. 26.—(A.P.)—Dag Hammariskjold arrived in Beirut on his Middle East peace mission tonight. Small arms fire swept the airport road near newly established positions of United States troops shortly before the United Nations secretary-general flew in from Rome.

Hospital sources said two Lebanese were killed and six injured.

United States Air Force officers said they understood one American was shot. Under the city's strict curfew, it was impossible to confirm this immediately.

The U. N. chief, tired by his long journey from New York, was surrounded by Lebanese security forces as he climbed from his plane.

Reporters and photographers were crowded a way from the secretary-general. One Lebanese drew a pistol to force back a cameraman.

Earlier, an assassin shot and killed Abdullah Nurallah, secretary of a Lebanese industrial organization, in one of Beirut's traffic-jammed streets. Nurallah was shot while leaving his automobile near a friend's office.

Lebanon tonight reimposed censorship on outgoing news dispatches only 24 hours after having abolished it.

# 20-Ton Load Spills On Road as Trailer Overturns

A truck and trailer, loaded with 20 tons of machinery, swerved from Airport Way near Norfolk Street and overturned in a ditch about 4 o'clock this morning.

The driver, Bud Thompson, 36, of Portland, Ore., was uninjured.

Airport Way was restricted to two lanes of traffic until about 7 o'clock this morning while a large crane and two towing trucks righted the vehicle and replaced the machinery on the trailer.

Police Sgt. Stewart E. Worrell estimated damage to the truck-trailer was traveling.

The truck-trailer dropped over a 4-foot embankment and struck the grocery warehouse fence. Part of the machinery, used in manufacture of plywood, was spilled.

The machinery, manufactured in Seattle, was being taken to an Oregon plywood manufacturing concern, Worrell said. It was reloaded on another truck and driven to Oregon.
